Have to / Must + infinitive

Have to and *must* express an obligation. *Have to* usually expresses an external obligation.

(+)				(-)			
I / You / We / They	have to	do	homework.	I / You / We / They	don't have to	do	homework.
He / She	has to			He / She	doesn't have to

Do	I/ you / we / they	have to	do	homework?	Yes,	I / you / we / they	do.	I / you / we / they	don't.
Does	he / she					he / she	does.	No,	he / she

I / you / he / she / we / they	must	go	shopping.
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Want / Need + infinitive

Want expresses a desire and *need* expresses a necessity.

For example, we say *want to do something* and *need to do something*.

When we want or need help from someone else, we say *I want X to do something* or *I need X to do something*.

I / You / We / They	want	to go to the library.	
He / She	wants	to go to the library.	
I / You / We / They	need	to go to the library.	
He / She	needs	to go to the library.	

I / You / We / They	want	me / you / him / her / us / them	to go to the library.	This is a desire.
He / She	wants	me / you / him / her / us / them	to go to the library.	
I / You / We / They	need	me / you / him / her / us / them	to go to the library.	This is a necessity.
He / She	needs	me / you / him / her / us / them	to go to the library.	

Do	I / you / we / they	want / need	to go to the library?
Does	he / she	want / need	to go to the library?
