Too many / too much / too

We use *too much*, *too many* and *too* to say that there is more than necessary of something.

Remember!

- *Too many* goes before a countable noun.
- *Too much* goes before an uncountable noun.
- *Too* goes before an adjective.

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| I've got | too many | computer games. | before countable nouns |
| There is | too much | water. | before uncountable nouns |
| This is | too | difficult. | before adjectives |

Enough

We use *enough* to say that there is sufficient of something.

Remember! Enough goes

- before a noun.
- after an adjective.

| | | | |
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| There aren't | enough | computers. | before a noun |
| This smartphone isn't | big | enough. | after an adjective |

Superlatives

We use *the* + superlative adjectives to say which is the biggest, the smallest, etc in a group.

| Adjective | <i>the</i> + superlative adjective | |
|-----------|------------------------------------|--|
| cheap | the cheapest | We add est to adjectives that have one syllable. |
| big | the biggest | We add one more consonant + est when adjectives end in a vowel + a consonant. |
| friendly | the friendliest | We change the y to an i + est when the adjective ends in consonant + y. |
| expensive | the most expensive | We add the most + the adjective when the adjective has two or more syllables. |

- We also add the + -est to ones with two syllables if they end in **-er, -ly, -y**.
 – (CLEVER) The cleverest. (FRIENDLY) The friendliest.
 (TASTY) The tastiest.
 Note that the "y" becomes "i".
