# 5 question interviews: Rachel Carter, author

**A** \_\_\_\_\_?

You need to ask my readers that question! I think there are a lot of romance books aimed at girls and action books that are written for boys, but I think teenagers like my books as mystery stories are interesting for both sexes. I don't believe boys' and girls' interests are as different as television and adverts suggest. I think they also like the fact that the teenagers are always smarter than the adults in my books!

I first got interested in writing when I was a student. I regularly wrote short stories for the university magazine. Then I got a job helping in a summer club for teenagers and I saw what kind of books they were reading. It was after that, in my job as a teaching assistant, that I began writing for this younger age group, rather than adults.

Absolutely. I know a lot of people worry that it's bad for books, but I don't agree. I think digital books have got a lot of teenagers reading more. Young people love using their phones and tablets, and e-books offer teenagers lots of different ways to read. I think as writers we have to accept that times have changed and that the new generation of readers want a more digital experience.

I have much more contact with my readers now. Before, I didn't use to communicate much with them, sometimes I'd receive a letter or two but now, as I have a website and I write a blog, we're always in touch. At first, I must admit I wasn't very keen on creating my own website as I thought it would be too much extra work. Now I love it! I really enjoy the fact that teenagers write on my website and tell me what they think of a book. I really believe this helps me create better books as I have a clearer idea of what kinds of subjects and characters interest teenagers.

I'm not sure, I hope they don't. I love e-books and I think the future for e-books is very exciting, as I believe they will develop and become more interactive. However, I think people will always like to have a bookcase full of their favourite books in their living room. I really enjoy spending time looking round old bookshops and I still think there's something special about looking through the pages of a very old book.
