Word	Meaning
pristine (adj.)	In perfect condition: completely clean, fresh, neat, etc.  Example: My office is a mess, but her office is always <i>pristine</i> .
dominant (adj.)	Exercising the most power, control, or influence  Example: <i>the dominant nations during the Cold War</i> .
deplore (v.)	Feel or express strong disapproval of (something).  Example: <i>to deplore the present state of morality</i> .
dimensions (n.)	A measurement of the size of something in a particular direction, such as the length, width, height, or diameter  Example: <i>Space-time has three dimensions of space and one of time</i> .
stereotypes (n.)	A generalization usually exaggerated or oversimplified and often offensive, that is used to describe or distinguish a group.  Example: <i>The cowboy is an American stereotype</i> .
stared (v.)	To gaze fixedly and intently, especially with the eyes wide open.  Example: <i>to stare a person up and down</i> .
ignorant (adj.)	Not knowing something you should know, or you need to know. Example: Rich people are ignorant to the reality of the lives of those living in poverty.
prevailing (adj.)	Existing at a particular time or in a particular place. Example: The prevailing market conditions are not favorable to small investors.
transplant (v.)	To move from one place to another. Example: Wilkins was transplanted from Harlem to Grand Rapids.
impulsively adv.	Done suddenly without thinking what the result will be. Example: He often acts impulsively and later regrets it.
