Conditional sentences. -

Conditional sentences are statements discussing known factors or hypothetical situations and their consequences. Complete conditional sentences contain a conditional **clause** (often referred to as the if-clause) and the consequence. **CHARACTERISTICS:**

- There are four types of conditional sentences (Zero – First – Second – Third).
- It's important to use the correct structure for each of these different conditional sentences because they express varying meanings.
- Pay attention to verb tense when using different conditional modes.
- Use a comma after the if-clause when the if-clause precedes the main clause.
- The structure can be: IF + CLAUSE , → RESULT or
RESULT → IF + CLAUSE

Second conditional

We use second conditional when we want to talk about an imaginary or impossible situation.

◊ If I were the president, I would build more schools.

□ to give an advice, in this case we use "if I were you" for the if clause and "would" for the main clause.

◊ If I were you, I would go on a diet.

2nd CONDITIONAL

**If + past simple,
WOULD + infinitive**

We use the 2nd Conditional for future situations that are hypothetical.

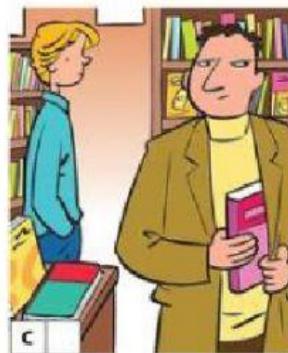
If I studied, I would pass the exam.

"Hard work conquers everything."

EXAMPLES:

- If I won the lottery, I would buy a big house. (I probably won't win the lottery)
- If I met the Queen of England, I would say hello.
- She would travel all over the world if she were rich.
- She would pass the exam if she ever studied. (She never studies, so this won't happen)
