fall	n	a decrease in something	We expect a fall in the daytime temperature next week.	-
flexibility	n	the ability to change easily depending on a situation	Being a driver allows flexibility in the hours I can work.	flexible; flexibly
policy	n	the system of rules in an organisation	The company's policy on safety at work is very clear.	-
rare	adj	not common; unusual	He suffers from a rare disease that little is known about.	rarity; rareness; rarely
remarkable	adj	unusual or surprising in a way that makes people to take notice	Carl's singing voice is quite remarkable .	remarkably

to cope with	v	to deal with a difficult situation	How are we going to cope with no internet connection?	-
to decline	v	a steady decrease in something	The number of shoppers visiting our store has declined recently.	-
to estimate	v	to guess a number or amount based on information	I estimate that around fifty people will come to my party.	estimate; estimation
to jump	v	to increase; go up, e.g., in quantity	House prices have jumped by 10% this year.	Jump; jumping; jumped
to look into	v	to find out information about something	We are looking into why the accident happened.	-
to review	v	to see or view again	The manager will review your letter of complaint immediately.	review; reviewer
to take off	v	to leave somewhere quickly	Nick took off in a hurry and told no-one where he was going.	-

to transfer	v	to move something or someone to a different place	I plan to transfer my business to a different building.	transference; transfer; transferability
to volunteer	v	to agree to work for no pay	John volunteered to work an extra hour for free on Saturdays.	volunteerism; voluntary
tough	adj	difficult	She finds it tough to balance work and free time.	-
widow	n	a woman whose husband has died	She found life as a widow quite lonely after Ken died.	widowhood; widower; widow; widowed
