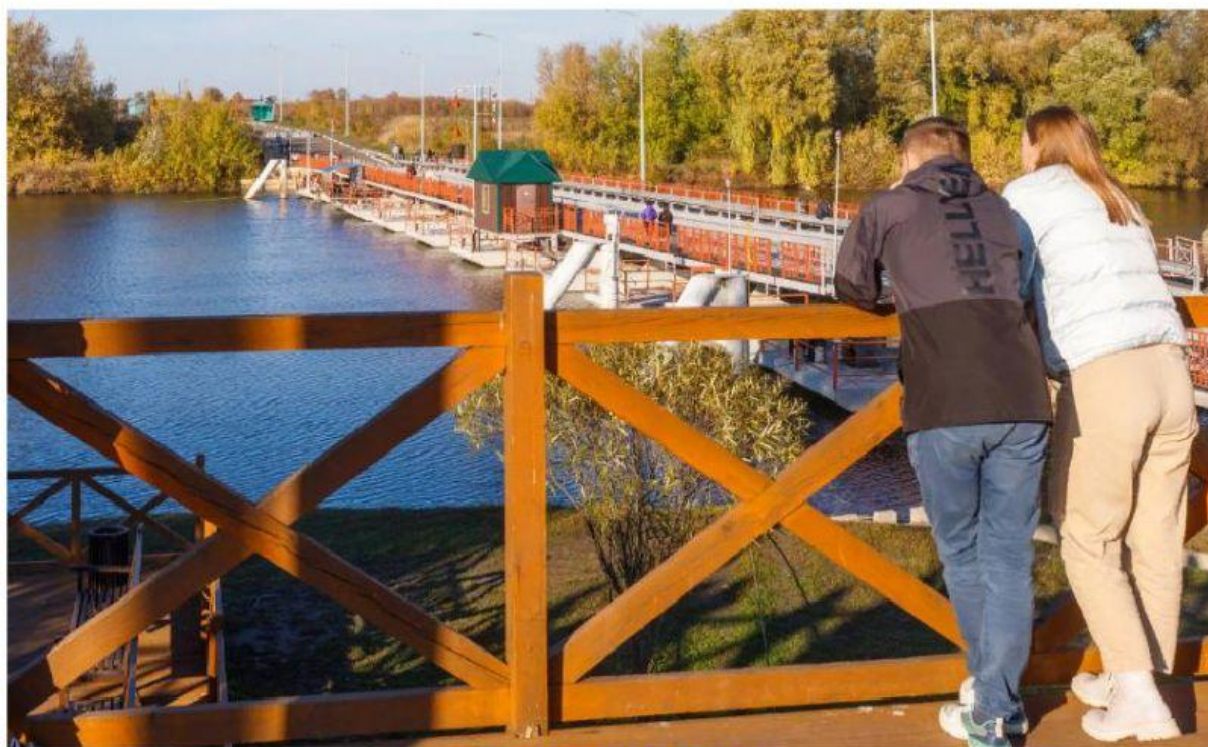




In the following questions each sentence has four italicised words or phrases in italics. The four underlined parts of the sentence are marked (1),(2),(3), and (4).

Identify the one italicised word or phrase that must be changed in order for the sentence to be correct.

2. *Mary's and Ann's* (1) mother is a doctor. She is *a very good one* (2), *most of* (3) the people say (4).
3. Her *new* (1) dictionary of phrasal verbs is not very good *for the lessons*. (2) *My* (3) is much better. (4)
4. Where *can we* (1) buy *any* (2) cat food *for my cat* (3)? I am nearly sure we don't have *any* (4).
