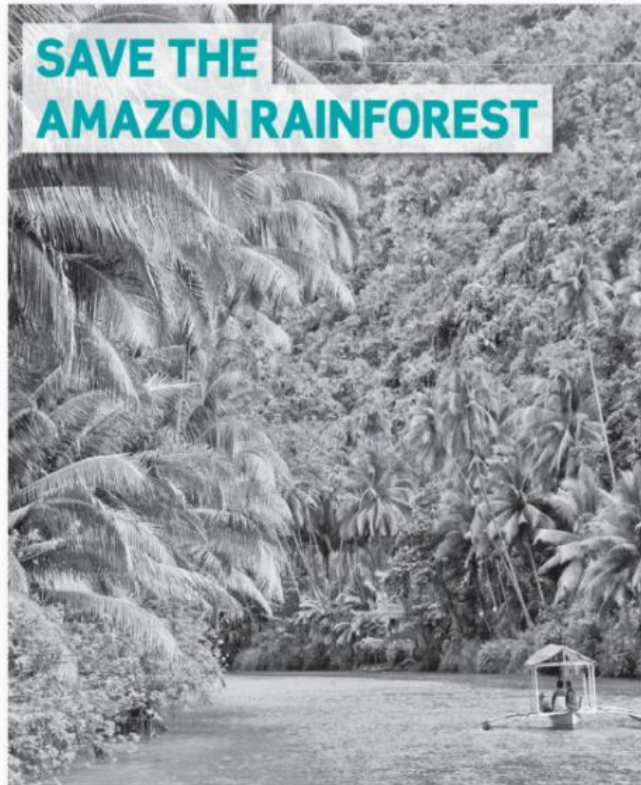


- 7 Read the article about the future of the Amazon rainforest and choose the correct options to complete the text.



The Amazon rainforest is the largest tropical rainforest in the world, covering over five and a half million square kilometres. It's home to 10% of the world's known animals and plants, but if we continue to destroy the forest as we are doing now, we can be sure of one thing: many of these natural wonders <sup>1</sup>*may not / (won't)* survive. Jaguars, giant river otters, tapirs and other animals <sup>2</sup>*will / might* almost certainly become extinct in the wild.
