REMEMBER

IF	CONDITION	RESULT
	PAST SIMPLE	WOULD / WOULDN'T + BASE FORM VERB (without TO)
If	he won the lottery,	he would travel around the world.

RESULT	IF	CONDITION
WOULD / WOULDN'T + BASE FORM VERB (without TO)		PAST SIMPLE
He would travel around the world	if	he won the lottery.

We use the second conditional when there is an **unreal possibility** that the condition will happen in the future (not impossible but difficult to come true) and also for **hypothetical situations**.

! DON'T FORGET we use **were** (not was) **for advice**: e.g. If I **were** you I wouldn't open that door.
