A Good morning. Today, we're going to tell you about a very special woman named Helen Keller.

B Helen Keller was born in 1880. When she was a very young child, a serious illness left her unable to see **or** hear. From that time onwards, she could only understand things through touch **and** the vibration of movements around her. In the late 19<sup>th</sup> century, people didn't believe that deaf and blind people could do anything, **so** they were often isolated from the rest of the world. **However**, Helen was very lucky because her family did not want to accept this.

C When she was 6 years old, her family arranged for her to meet Anne Sullivan, a young teacher who taught her sign language through touch. Helen was very frustrated and angry at first **because** she didn't understand that there was a separate word for each object or person. **But** gradually, with Anne's help, she learned to sign fluently, to read Braille, and even learned to speak.

D In 1904, Helen Keller graduated from Harvard University with a college degree. She wrote several books about her life, and she became a public speaker, too. Helen used her skills and talents to improve the lives of deaf and blind people.

E Anne Sullivan remained with Helen until Anne died in 1936. Helen lived until the age of 87 and died in 1968. Today, she is remembered for showing the world what deaf and blind people can do, and for helping to make their lives easier.
