

READING IN ENGLISH

Some tips:

- Reading in English helps you to learn and remember vocabulary and grammar.
- When you read, be careful with different kinds of pronouns and possessive adjectives: he, his, him, etc. Make sure you know who (or what) they refer to.
- Pay attention to titles, images and colors. They help you to understand stories.
- It's not necessary to understand all the words you find in the text. Use a dictionary to help you, but concentrate on key words (words that are important, they are repeated so you need to understand them).
- Before looking at a word, read the whole paragraph and try to guess its meaning.
