

Today, people spend about seven hours every day using technology such as television, radios, MP3 players, phones and computers. Teenagers spend a lot of this time using their cell phones. Alexander Graham Bell invented the first telephone in the UK in 1876, but it was only in 1973 that Dr. Martin Cooper at Motorola invented the cell phone in the US. The phones were very big and heavy, and they were unpopular because there weren't any networks. Japan created the first network in 1979. The first cell phones only made phone calls—they didn't do anything else. Then, in 1993, people started sending text messages in Finland, and cell phones became more popular. Today, 85 percent of American adults have a cell phone, and half of British teenagers have smart phones. Smart phones are cell phones, but you can do a lot more than make phone calls with them. You can send texts, take photos and videos, listen to the radio and connect to the Internet. When you are online, you can watch movies, send emails, play games ... and much more. In the future, smart phones are going to get thinner, like paper, and they are going to get even smarter!
