Tshuma's job is to keep the lions away from the villages on the edge of the park. If Charles and other guards **wouldn't do / didn't do** this, the lions and the people in the village would not be able to live side by side.

Recently, Charles was told a lion was approaching a village. When Charles arrived at the village, he started blowing a large plastic horn. When the lion heard the loud noise, it returned to the park. If Charles **didn't frighten / hadn't frightened** the lion in this way, it **might have eaten / might eat** one of the goats in the village. And if this **had happened / happened**, the owner of the animal **could kill / could have killed** the lion.

So far, the lion guard programme has been successful. It has kept the people in villages and the lions safe. If this **will happen / happens**, they may not return to the park when they hear this sound. This could mean that a villager could get hurt or that an angry farmer might shoot and kill a lion.
