Women in Saudi Arabia began registering to vote this week for the first time in the nation's history. The late King Abdullah announced in November, 2015 that women would be allowed to run for office and vote in city elections, which (1) _____ every four years. At least 70 women intend to run for office, and more than 80 registered as campaign managers, Arab News reported last month. While the legal barrier to voting has been lifted, other Saudi laws and culture could complicate women's (2) _____ to cast their votes.

Saudi women still have to deal with limits on their freedom of movement, and since it's illegal for them to drive, many of them will have to (3) _____ male members of their family to take them to register and to vote. Male relatives who oppose female voting rights could also be a barrier. The government also requires voters to have personal ID cards, and many Saudi women do not.

To make serious progress on women's rights, Saudi authorities should stop the male guardianship system, under which caring policies and practices (4) _____ women from obtaining a passport, marrying, traveling, or accessing higher education without the approval of a male guardian. THE SUFFRAGETTES

England has had a democracy for a long time. Until 1918, however, women were not allowed to vote in it. The right to vote is called 'suffrage' and the English women who fought (11) _____ and won that right were called "suffragettes".

The suffragette movement was led by Emmiline Pankhurst. In 1903, she (12) _____ an organization called the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU). Members of the WSPU went to the Prime Minister to demand suffrage, but he told them to "be patient". The suffragettes were not satisfied. They wanted change immediately.

The fight for the vote for women became intense and sometimes violent. In 1908, two suffragettes chained themselves to the fence outside the Prime Ministers front door! They were arrested and spent weeks in jail. In 1912, hundreds of women (13) _____ the streets of London. They broke shop windows and even threw Stones at the Prime Minister's house. Thousands of suffragettes were jailed for this and similar actions over the years.

World War I (1914-1918) proved to be an important (14) _____ for the women's movement. Women contributed so much to the war effort as nurses', factory workers, and at other jobs that more people became convinced of their right to vote. Women were (15) _____ given that right in January, 1918.

The issue of equality for women in British society first attracted national attention in the early 20th century, when the suffragettes won for women the right to vote. In the 1960s, feminism - the belief that women and men are equal in abilities and should have equal rights and opportunities - became the subject of **intense** debate when the women's lib movement encouraged women to reject their traditional supporting role and to demand equal status and equal rights with men in areas such as employment and pay.

Since then, the gender gap between the sexes has been reduced. The Equal Pay Act of 1970, for instance, made it illegal for women to be paid less than men for doing the same work, and in 1975 the Sex Discrimination Act aimed to prevent either sex having an unfair advantage when applying for jobs. In the same year the Equal Opportunities Commission was set up to help people claim their rights to equal treatment and to publish research and statistics to show where improvements in opportunities for women need to be made. Women now have much better employment opportunities than formerly, though they still tend to get less well-paid jobs than men, and very few are appointed to top jobs in industry.

Many people believe that there is still a long way to go before women are treated as equals in employment. In education, however, girl's and women's opportunities have improved rapidly and in public employment there are policies to increase the proportion of women employed, which is still very low at senior levels.
