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Remember...

a / an, some and any



- We use *a* or *an* to talk about singular nouns we can count e.g. *a stone*, *an apple*.
- We use *some* for plural nouns we can count e.g. *some seeds*, *some cherries*.
- We also use *some* for nouns we can't count and which haven't got plural forms e.g. *some food*, *some fruit*, *some smoke*. You can find examples in the story.
- We use *any* in negative sentences and questions.
