

If I have a holiday this summer, I'll go to London.



If I go to London, I'll see the Houses of Parliament.



As soon as I arrive in London, I'll try fish and chips!



If you go to London in the summer, you won't see the Queen. She always spends the summer in Scotland.



Presentation

Use the first conditional to talk about:

- future possibility: *If I go to London this summer, I'll visit the Houses of Parliament.*
- things which are generally true: *If you go to London in the summer, you won't see the Queen.*

If clause	main clause
If present simple	will/won't
If I go to London,	I'll see the Houses of Parliament.
If you go in the summer,	you won't see the Queen.

when, as soon as, unless, until, before

We use similar sentences with *when, as soon as, unless, until, before* to talk about the future.

If clause	main clause
When present simple	will / won't
When you arrive in London,	you'll take the underground.
As soon as I arrive in London,	I'll try fish and chips.

Always use a present tense, not a future form, after these expressions.

They'll stay at the hotel until the tour bus arrives.

We'll have a rest before we go out this evening.

Unless = if not

We'll go sightseeing unless the weather is bad. (= if the weather isn't bad.)

When the *if* clause comes first, we use a comma between the two clauses.

If I go on holiday this summer, I'll visit London.

When the main clause comes before the *if* clause, do not use a comma:

I'll visit London if I go on holiday this summer.
