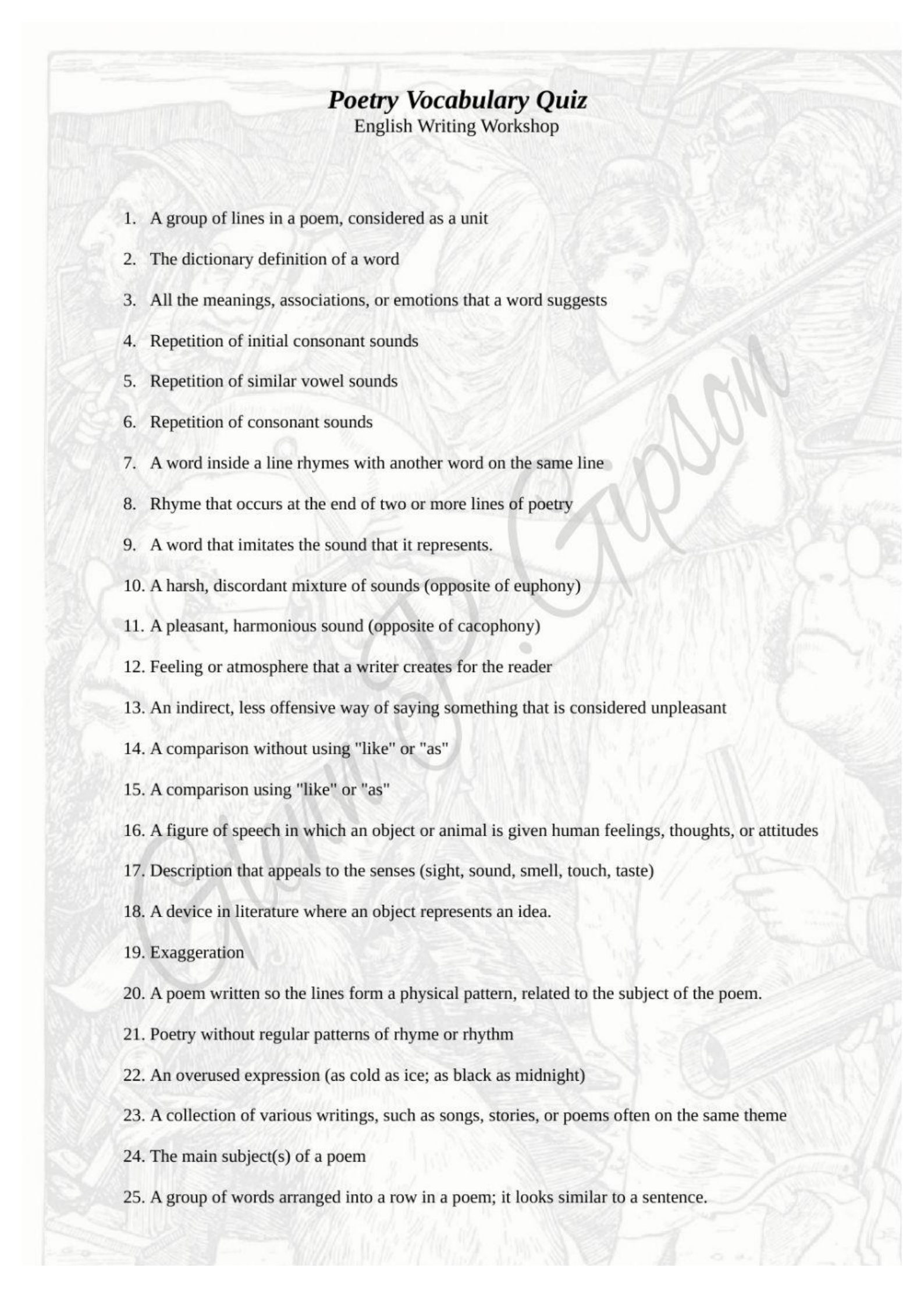
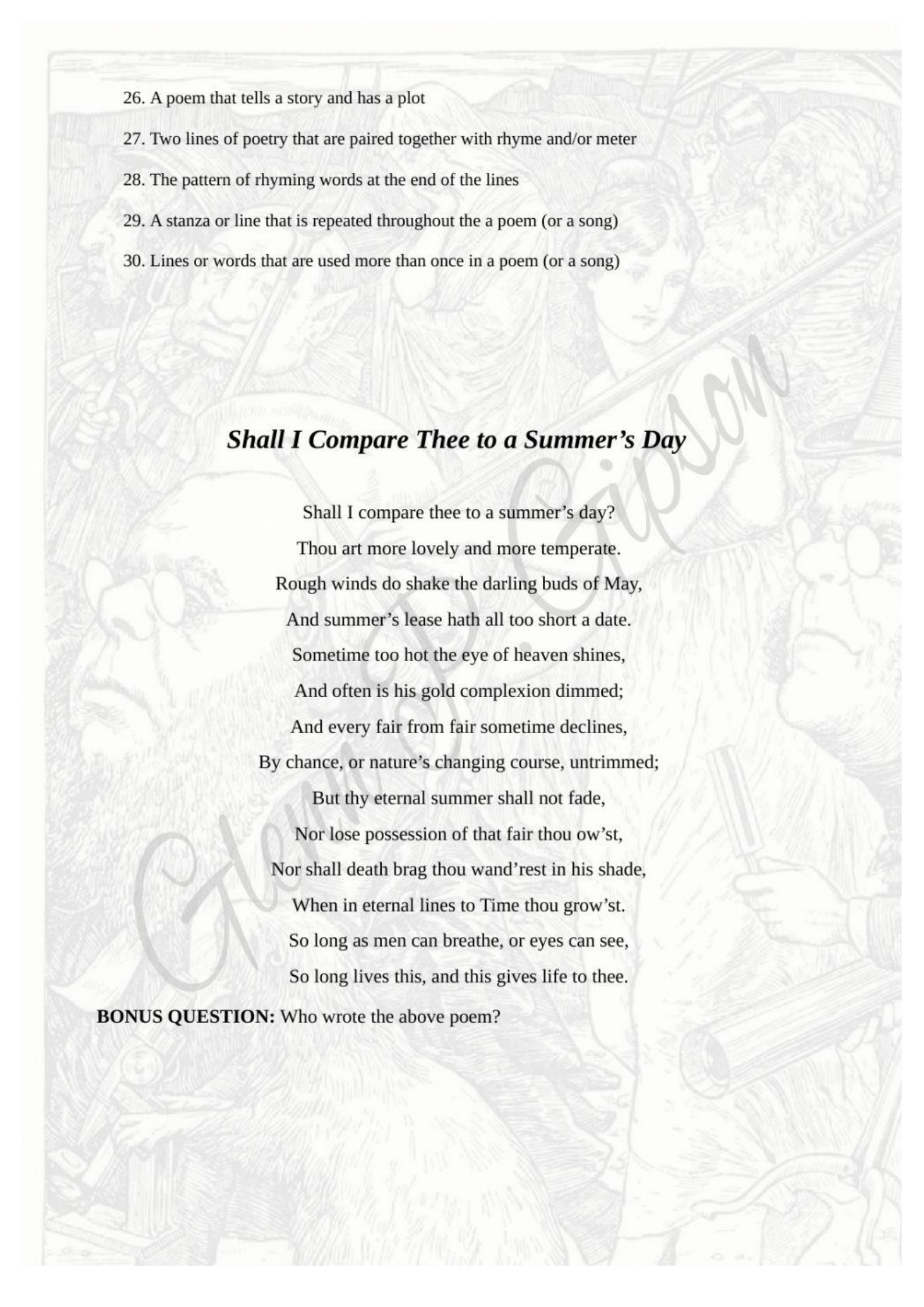

25. A group of words arranged into a row in a poem; it looks similar to a sentence.

27. Two lines of poetry that are paired together with rhyme and/or meter
28. The pattern of rhyming words at the end of the lines
29. A stanza or line that is repeated throughout the a poem (or a song)
30. Lines or words that are used more than once in a poem (or a song)
