

## **PRESENT PERFECT WITH **ALREADY** AND **YET****

In the Present Perfect tense, we use **already** with **affirmative** sentences and **yet** with **questions** or **negative** sentences.

### ***Affirmative***

I have **already** seen Avatar 2.

She has **already** left for school.

They have **already** read this book.

### ***Negative***

I haven't been to the Prado museum **yet**.

We haven't found the treasure **yet**.

He hasn't shown his grades to his parents **yet**.

### ***Questions***

Have you done your homework **yet**?

**Yes**, I have **already** done my homework.

Have you handed in your English review **yet**?

**Yes**, I have **already** handed it in.

Has he washed the car **yet**?

**No**, he hasn't washed the car **yet**.

Have they finished painting the baby's room **yet**?

**No**, they haven't finished painting it **yet**.

As you can see, **yet** **ALWAYS** goes at the **end** of the sentence (or the question).

And **already** goes **between the have/has and the past participle** (just like **just**).
