

PRESENT PERFECT WITH ALREADY AND YET

In the Present Perfect tense, we use **already** with **affirmative** sentences and **yet** with **questions** or **negative** sentences.

Affirmative

I have **already** seen Avatar 2.

She has **already** left for school.

They have **already** read this book.

Negative

I haven't been to the Prado museum **yet**.

We haven't found the treasure **yet**.

He hasn't shown his grades to his parents **yet**.

Questions

Have you done your homework **yet**?

Yes, I have **already** done my homework.

Have you handed in your English review **yet**?

Yes, I have **already** handed it in.

Has he washed the car **yet**?

No, he hasn't washed the car **yet**.

Have they finished painting the baby's room **yet**?

No, they haven't finished painting it **yet**.

As you can see, **yet** **ALWAYS** goes at the **end** of the sentence (or the question).

And **already** goes **between the have/has and the past participle** (just like just).
