

# FOR and SINCE



We use **FOR** when we are talking about a period of time.

We use **SINCE** when we are talking about the start of the period.

We use **for** and **since** to say how long:

Ayu is in Japan. She **has been there** **for three days.**  
**since Monday.**

I have practiced taekwondo **for** 5 years.



I have practiced taekwondo **since** 2019.

Monday	Wednesday

24 July	Christmas
January	I was ten years old
1985	we arrived
