

READING: Skimming and scanning



A Have you ever tried to be more like a character in a novel? Perhaps you started using one of the character's phrases or bought clothes to look more like him or her. If this describes you, you are not alone! Research suggests that readers of novels sometimes start behaving – and even thinking – like the fictional characters in their favorite books. Some may even start believing what the characters believe. It seems that what we read can have a huge effect on us.

B Other studies on the effects of reading found that many readers could actually “hear” what the characters on the page were saying. Characters had an actual “voice.” For some readers, that voice wasn’t silenced when the book was put down. A reader might be choosing a dish in a restaurant and find him- or herself wondering what a character from a favorite novel might order. In fact, some readers even reported having regular conversations in their heads with characters as if they had a real-life relationship with them. Others said that once a novel was finished, they found themselves “missing” a character, just as they would miss a departed friend or lover.

C Interestingly, it seems that what people experience when reading isn’t quite the same as their experience when watching a movie. People watching a movie might react emotionally to what they see, but they remain aware that they are watching someone else. People reading a story lose their sense of “separateness” and personally feel what the character feels. What we read, then, has a powerful effect on the human mind.

D So what is it about the written word that makes characters live and breathe for us? Why do we feel this unique connection with people in books? The answer might lie in the brain’s reaction. What scientists have recently discovered is that reading causes activity in many more areas of the brain than previously thought. You would expect that the words “lemon,” “roses,” and “perfume” would cause activity in the language-processing parts of your brain. However, it seems they also excite the areas of the brain related to smells. In other words, reading about an experience is more like actually having that experience than we previously thought.
