Remember in formal emails we should not give personal likes or dislikes, and avoid verbs like 'want', 'love', and similar.

Keep the information as professional/academic as possible

## INFORMAL LANGUAGE:

I am interested in taking a course on ... because I like helping people and in my free time I would like to...

## FORMAL VERSION:

I am interested in taking a course on ... because one of my main goals is to contribute to society both professionally and personally.

# FORMAL / INFORMAL LANGUAGE

## INFORMAL LANGUAGE:

Since I was 5 I have loved ...

## FORMAL VERSION:

... has been among my interests from an early age.

# FORMAL / INFORMAL LANGUAGE

## INFORMAL LANGUAGE:

I would like to run the family business and I believe I can do it as well as my father

## FORMAL VERSION:

I have always aimed at successfully running the family business.

# FORMAL / INFORMAL LANGUAGE

## INFORMAL LANGUAGE:

I am writing to you because I have some questions about your university

## FORMAL VERSION:

I am writing this email regarding the course offers at your university.

I am writing this email in order to obtain information about your university

# FORMAL / INFORMAL LANGUAGE

## INFORMAL LANGUAGE:

I am the student with the highest marks

## FORMAL VERSION:

My main objective has always been obtaining great results and I intend to do so at your university.

See my grades attached.



# FORMAL / INFORMAL LANGUAGE

## INFORMAL LANGUAGE:

Studying in English will give me different opportunities, like for example, travelling to other countries

## FORMAL VERSION:

Studying in English will give me different opportunities, helping me reinforce the ability to develop my language skills professionally.
