

Say versus Tell

Review the rules about using the verbs “say” and “tell.” Then complete the exercise below.

SAY

- simple past and past participle: *said*
- can be followed directly by what was said
- example: The teacher said to complete the homework by Sunday night.
- can be followed by “to” + person.
- example: The teacher said *to us*, “Your homework is due on Sunday night.”

TELL

- simple past and past participle: *told*
- followed directly by the person someone is speaking to
- example: The teacher told *us* to do our homework by Sunday night.
