

WILL

will: prediction

We use *will* to talk about a future event, something that we think or predict will happen. We usually use the contraction *won't* (*will not*) for a negative prediction. After *will* / *won't* we use the infinitive without *to*.



Will for prediction (affirmative and negative)		
I / You / He / She We / They	✓ will	be successful. live in a flat. enjoy your job.
	✗ won't

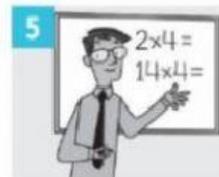
