I live here. She often phones me. They play football every day.

- We use the present simple:
 - to talk about something that is always or usually true:
I live here. Children ask a lot of questions.
 - to talk about things that happen regularly:
She often phones me. They play football every day.
- We often use adverbs of frequency (e.g. *always, usually, often, sometimes, never*) and other time expressions (e.g. *every day, in the morning*) with the present simple. The adverbs come before the verb. *Every day, in the morning*, etc. come at the beginning or end of the sentence:
She often phones me. They play football every day.
- In affirmative sentences, we add *-s* or *-es* in the third person singular (*he, she, it*):
I live → he lives we watch → she watches they fly → it flies

Affirmative I/you/we/they live he/she/it lives
