| 1791-1808 | | 1807 French invasion (Napoleón). 1808- Aranjuez riot (Motín de Aranjuez). 1808 – Abdication of Carlos IV he left for France. |
| 1808-1814 | | Independence war (1808- 1814) .1812 Cadiz constitution. |
| 1814-1833 | | 1814 he returned to Spain. Absolutism: no rights or liberties for citizens. Cadiz constitution abolished. New law of succession: Pragmática Sanción. Independence of colonies. |
| 1833-1868 | | Parliamentary monarchy 1868 Exile to France |
| 1871 | | He didn't have much support so he decided to abdicate. |

Order the following events

Carlos IV, king of Spain allowed him to go across Spain.

this is called the war of independence that lasted until 1814 when the French troops were expelled and Fernando VII came back as the new king of Spain.

On the way to Portugal the French troops invaded some Spanish cities.

The population organised a riot called the Motin of Aranjuez and forced Carlos IV to abdicate.

His son Fernando VII is the new king. Then Napoleon forced him to abdicate.

During the war, the Spanish parliament approved the 1st constitution in Cadiz 1812, in it some rights were established as the right to vote.

The population of Madrid didn't accept José Bonaparte and they rebelled against him.

Now Jose Bonaparte, his brother, is the new king.

The population called him Pepe Botella.

In 1807 Napoleon Bonaparte emperor of France decided to occupy Portugal.
