

## Present perfect; already, yet

When you want to talk about the past, but the date is not important, use the present perfect.

- ✓ Use **YET** in interrogative sentences, and place it at the end of the sentence.

Have you done your homework **YET**?

Has the teacher called you **YET**?

- ✓ Use **YET** in negative sentences, and place it at the end of the sentence.

No, I haven't done my homework **YET**.

No, The teacher hasn't called me **YET**.

- ✓ Use **ALREADY** in affirmative sentences, and place it between have/has and the past participle.

Yes, I have **ALREADY** done my homework.

Yes, the teacher has **ALREADY** called me.
