Direct object (Od): I **love** her.
She **likes** me.

Indirect object (Oi): I **told** him the truth.
He **gives** us a lot of homework.

- After a preposition:

Indirect object (Oi): I **have bought** a present **for** you.
I've **written** a letter **to** them.

Other prepositions: **Don't worry** about it.

Talking **about** peace **is** easy.
