Shoppers rush to the High Street as England stores reopen

Coronavirus pandemic

Demand increased across England's High Streets, retail parks and shopping centres on Monday as some shops reopened after a three-month lockdown.

Footfall was 38.8% higher than last week, as high demand caused long queues.

However, shopper numbers were generally far below the same time last year.

But Bicester Village, a shopping centre near Oxford, was so crowded that 3,000 people signed a petition to close it.

All shops in England are now allowed to open, but with strict safety measures.

Safety measures include plastic screens at the tills and floor markings to keep shoppers two metres apart - measures that are already regular in supermarkets.

Jaydee Darrock, from Warwickshire, was one of the first customers inside Primark's Birmingham store after queuing from about 07:00. She described it as "surprisingly calm".

"We thought it would be chaotic, it's not, it's quite nice," she said.

Vocabulary

Demand = a need for something to be sold or supplied

Footfall = the number of people who go into a shop or business at a particular time

Sign = write your signature

Petition = a document signed by a large number of people demanding or asking for some action from the government or another authority

Plastic screen = piece of thin plastic that blocks or covers something

Till = cash register in a shop or business

Floor marking = something written or drawn on the floor to give instructions

Regular = common or normal

Chaotic = hectic / very busy
