



Superlative degree

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We use the **SUPERLATIVE** form when we describe one object or person in a group of **three or more** and we want to **express the extreme or highest degree of a quality**.

Adjectives of three or more syllables form the superlative with **the most**:

" Maths is **the most difficult** school subject"
