REMEMBER

We use continuous tenses for:

- actions or situations in progress at a particular moment – *What **were you doing** when I called?*
- temporary actions or situations – *I'm **living** here for a few months.*
- unfinished actions or situations – *I've **been working** on a new invention recently.*
- annoying habits – *You're **always criticising** me.*
- events continuing up to a particular moment or stopping just before it – *I'm tired because I've **been studying** all evening.*
