The secret of success


Taylor Swift and Ed Sheeran have a very special friendship and often sing together. They may come from very different backgrounds, but both have had a similar path to success.

Swift, who grew up on a family farm in Pennsylvania, had two passions: writing and music. In spite of the fact that her writing talent was noticed very early (she won a national poetry contest and even wrote an unpublished novel), Swift really wanted to be a singer. How did she achieve her goal to become the Taylor Swift we know today?

To put it simply, Swift had determination. In 2004, she ¹**talked** her family _____ moving to Nashville so she could be part of the country music scene. (Despite having a grandmother who was a well-known opera singer, Swift preferred country music.) She wrote and performed non-stop and, before long, her concerts started to ²**sell** _____ the minute tickets went on sale. Those who know her say her secret is an ability to visualize her lyrics before she writes a song. Maybe all that writing as a child ³**paid** _____ in the end!

Superficially, Ed Sheeran could not have been more different. He was a shy child who stuttered when he spoke, so he would repeat the lyrics of an old Eminem album hundreds of times. In spite of his shyness, Sheeran moved to London at 16 in order to become a professional musician. In the beginning, it was hard to ⁴**figure** _____ how to make a living, and even though he was playing over 300 live shows a year, he often had to sleep on the Underground, the London subway system. Sheeran never ⁵**gave** _____, though, and he released his first album in 2011. Two years later, everything changed when he went on a world tour supporting Taylor Swift. So what was his secret? According to Sheeran, he played music instead of video games when he was growing up.

Incredible tales like Swift's or Sheeran's are an inspiration to us all!

FOUR secrets to success

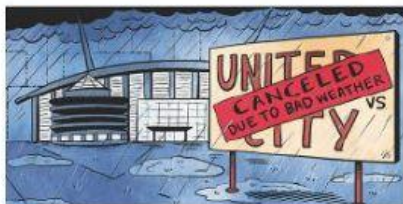
