One of the first books I ever read by myself when I was young was *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* by C.S. Lewis. The children go back to Narnia many times in different books but it's the winter Narnia that I always remember. I spent a lot of my childhood in that magical place! B

In my opinion the most incredible fantasy world ever created was the 'Looking Glass World' that Alice (in *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*) entered through a mirror. I loved it as a child and I still read it as a teenager! I just love the idea of being able to step through a mirror into a world where everything is a little crazy! The whole world is based on a chess game where Alice is a pawn (one of the soldiers in chess). She meets different characters as she moves across the board to eventually become a Queen and all the people in this world are totally nuts! It's marvellous but it's very clever too and there are lots of hidden references to the politicians and society of Lewis Carroll's time. This is my favourite book ever.

C

My mum had an old book that I read when I was about nine years old and it's been made a film too. It's called *The Borrowers* and it completely fascinated me. It's

about some tiny little people who live under the floors and in the walls of houses. They take things from our world to use – like match boxes for tables and the tin lids of perfume bottles for saucepans. I loved the idea that the things everyone is always losing – like pens, safety pins and so on, are actually ‘borrowed’ by little people. For a child it’s a wonderful world to imagine. It’s not like some fantasy novels or films where a completely different magical world has been created. The Borrowers’ world exists right alongside our own world. If only we were small enough to enter it!
