



To ask if someone has done something in his life, we use **EVER** in the question followed by a past participle.

Have you ever met a famous person?

If we refer to something we have never done in our life, we usually reply with **NEVER**.

I've never played golf.

Leslie: What are you doing? What is this list?

Kikki: These are the things I (1) **have done** (do) in my life!

Leslie: And what about this list?

Kikki: These are the things (2) I (not do) in my life!

Leslie: Let's see. (3) (you / ever see) the Statue of Liberty, in New York?

Kikki: Well, I (4) (see) photos but I (5) (never be) to New York.

Leslie: (6) (you / ever fly) in a hot air balloon?

Kikki: No, I (7) Hey, that's a fantastic idea! I'll write it down.

Leslie: (8) (you / ever see) the earth from space?

Kikki: No, I (9) That's number one on my list. Let's do it together one day!

Leslie: Brilliant idea!



Have been to - have gone to

- We use **has / have been** in order to talk about one's experiences, places one has been to, places one has travelled to.

He likes adventure. He's been to Africa, Asia and Australia.

- We use **has / have gone** to in order to say that one has gone somewhere and is still there. The phrase **have gone to** is the answer we get when we look for someone who is away.

Where's Mary? She's gone to the supermarket.

Complete with **have / has gone** or **have / has been**.

Tip

We use **have / has** gone to to answer when asked where someone is.

Where is Tom?

He's gone to the cinema.

He's been to the cinema. ✗
