

CAUSATIVE: HAVE SOMETHING DONE

Look at these examples: I cut my hair once a month (I do it myself)

I have my hair cut once a month (somebody does it for me, the hairdresser)

The second construction is passive in meaning. It describes situations where we want someone else to do something for us.

Structure: subject + have + object + past participle
