

## Phrasal Verbs: Expressions about Travel

A phrasal verb is a combination of a verb and one or two more short words.

[verb + adverb] eg: **look up**

[verb + preposition] eg: **look after**

[verb + adverb + preposition] eg: **look forward to**

The combination of the verb and the short words **changes the meaning** of the original verb. For example, **look up**, **look after** and **look forward to** do NOT mean the same as **look**.
