How to ask wh-questions when there is a preposition after the verb:

1. Begin your question with a wh-word or phrase that refers to the **unknown information**.
2. Put the **auxiliary verb** before the **subject**, and leave the preposition after the verb (often at the end of the question):

They're **searching** for **a phone number**.

What **are** **they** **searching** for?

The boy **shouted** at **his sister** from the tree.

Who **did** **the boy** **shout** at from the tree?

3. If the unknown information is the subject, or part of it, use the same word order as in the affirmative structure (S + V):

The government **is** **going to look** into the question.

Who **is** **going to look** into the question?

IMPORTANT: sometimes a wh- question can begin with a preposition, the same as in Spanish, especially with IN and ON:

In which country do they speak Dutch?

On which platform do we have to wait for the train?
