SHORT-SLEEPING: Is it always a problem?

Jimena Sánchez, a 28-year-old teacher, has been living on about four hours of sleep every night for as long as she can remember. Early this year, her husband persuaded her to look for a sleep specialist, and the diagnosis took everyone by surprise.

Dr. John Scorsone, a researcher from the sleep-disorder clinic she attended, assured Jimena she didn't have a sleep problem. After a series of tests, Dr. Scorsone concluded that Jimena was a "short sleeper" – someone who only needs a few hours' sleep each night.

Jimena claims she fits that description: "I go to bed at midnight, wake up at around four, and I never feel tired," she says. Jimena's previous doctors had suggested sleeping pills, but she refused to take them: "I'm glad I said no. Now

I know that I'm not sleep-deprived. I just don't need much sleep – that's all."

Dr. Scorsone based his diagnosis on a 2009 study at the University of Utah that discovered a rare gene in a mother and daughter who were able to function well on very little sleep. Since then, other studies have been carried out, but scientists are "only just beginning to understand this phenomenon," Dr. Scorsone claims.

It has been estimated that 1%–3% of the population consists of short-sleepers. For example, former UK Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher supposedly claimed she needed just four hours' sleep a night.

I asked Jimena if she felt short-sleeping was a problem: "No, not at all. It's so peaceful and quiet when I get up. I love it!"
