







CHARITY SHOPS FOR ALL

Although many clothes shops are finding it difficult to make money, charity shops in the UK have never been more popular. Many celebrities love to reveal that they combine dresses which cost thousands of pounds with items which cost next to nothing from a charity shop. We speak with two teenagers to find out what they love about second-hand fashion. 'My interest in charity shops started with hats,' says **Holly**, 18, from Essex. 'I know most people aren't into hats, but for me they add a touch of style to every outfit. Yesterday I bought a beautiful blue beret for just £1 which I'm going to wear to school tomorrow and I have a French fedora which I wear all the time. People are always coming up to me to compliment me on it, saying how trendy it is. If they only knew it cost me just £2!'

'I don't have much money to spend on clothes but that is not the main reason I visit charity shops. I think it is the best way to be green because the clothes are recycled, which is good for the planet.'

'I love the fact that every time you walk into a charity shop it's a new experience,' says **Jenny**, 17, from Hull. 'The High Street stores change their clothes only once or twice a year but charity shops have new items every day. Sometimes I find that normal clothes shops have all the clothes organised neatly in lines by colour; it's a bit boring. But in a charity shop you find all the clothes mixed up. For me, this helps my imagination and I can put together more original combinations. It's fun too!'



'I'm not interested in finding a Versace blouse for £10, although you can find top brands at great prices. For me, a fashion student, I am more interested in creating my own fashion. Often I will buy clothes and cut them to pieces and then get out my sewing machine at home and make something new. I had my own fashion show at school and the one thing that everyone agreed on was that my style is completely original.'

I ask Holly and Jenny if there is anything they don't like about charity shops.

'One thing that is tricky to find in charity shops is good handbags,' says **Holly**. 'I think the shop staff grab the good ones as soon as they arrive. But that's not as bad as when you find that perfect outfit and when you try it on it doesn't fit. That's so annoying.'

'For me I have noticed that as the charity shops get bigger they start to get more organised and start looking like normal shops,' says **Jenny**. 'As a result more people go in and it becomes more difficult to get a good bargain. In fact, I have noticed that the prices are slowly going up too, which is not great, especially for less well-off people who can't afford the prices of clothes in normal shops.'
