USE OF ADJECTIVES

We use adjectives to describe nouns.

Most adjectives can be used in front of a noun:

They have a beautiful house.

We saw a very exciting film last night.

or after a verb like be, look or feel:

Their house is beautiful.

That film looks interesting.

We usually put an opinion adjective in front of a descriptive adjective:

a nice red dress a silly old man those horrible yellow curtains

We use very, really and quite before adjectives:

He's really/very/quite tall.
