Point of View



Point of view is the relationship of the narrator, or storyteller, to the events of the story. The narrator in Shiloh is Marty, a character in the story. He uses the words I, me, and we as he tells the story from the first-person point of view. The reader learns what Marty thinks and feels about events. We have no way of knowing what other characters are thinking unless they tell Marty. The story would be told differently if another character were the narrator. Choose an episode in the first section and retell it from the point of view of another character. For example, you might retell the episode at the end of chapter 5 from the firstperson point of view of Judd or Mr. Preston, or the opening scene in chapter 1 from the firstperson point of view of the dog.
