

 **Kelly, USA** Kissing is not a common way to greet people in my country. We don't usually kiss. If it's my grandma, or occasionally my dad, it's a hug. To friends, I say 'hi' and sometimes **wave** or **give a high five**. If it's someone I don't know, I simply look at them and smile.

Satie, Japan In my country, people **bow** when they meet.

Juan, Mexico In Mexico, at a first meeting we **kiss on the cheek** – just one kiss. Men don't kiss each other; they shake hands. We Mexicans are very friendly people so we often **hug** the person as well, especially friends or relatives.

Pierre, France In my country, people usually **shake hands**. Among friends, men included, a double kiss on the cheek is common.
