**Read the following passage about the French, who were the second group of Europeans to come to Trinidad.**

In 1783, French planters were **encouraged** to settle in Trinidad under a law by the King of Spain. Philippe Roume de Saint-Laurent was one of the first French planters who **arrived**. He **persuaded** other French planters from islands such as Grenada, Martinique and Guadeloupe to come to Trinidad; they **agreed** and brought slaves with them. More slaves **landed** directly from Africa in the 1790s, and this **resulted** in Trinidad becoming a slave colony. Cotton, coffee and sugar cultivation began on plantations, but sugar **dominated** by the end of the century.

Carnival in Trinidad and Tobago is **celebrated** before the season of the Lent **commenced**. From 1783 for half a century, not only was French the main language spoken on the island, but the French **developed** their Carnival, which was **noted** to be a season of merry and elegant festivities which **extended** from Christmas to Ash Wednesday. These festivities **consisted** of dinners, balls, concerts and hunting parties.

The Africans **started** to have their own form of 'Carnival' from 1833 after the Emancipation Bill was passed, in which they **mocked** their former owners.
