Lesson 13 - Clauses of purpose

To introduce a clause of purpose we can use SO THAT or IN ORDER TO. These expressions are used at the beginning of the clause – it is the part of a sentence which explains why somebody does or did something. We can use any of them to express the same, what changes is the STRUCTURE. PAY ATTENTION to the examples.

Look at these examples:

My dad goes for long walks so that he can keep fit.

My dad goes for long walks in order to keep fit.
