NOUN Clauses:

- ★ **Function as _____ (often subjects)**
- ★ **Also function as _____, _____, OP, and Appositive.**

EXAMPLE:

- ★ **Cheese pizza sounds good.**
(noun/Subject)
- ★ **Whatever you want to order sounds good to me.**
(noun clause as subject)

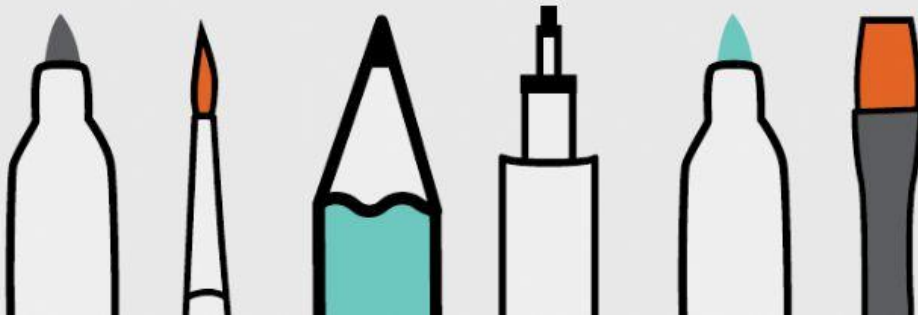

● **EXAMPLE:**

★ **The *angry* snake hissed at me.**
(adjective)

★ **The snake *that was angry* hissed at me. (clause as adjective)**

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ADVERB Clauses:

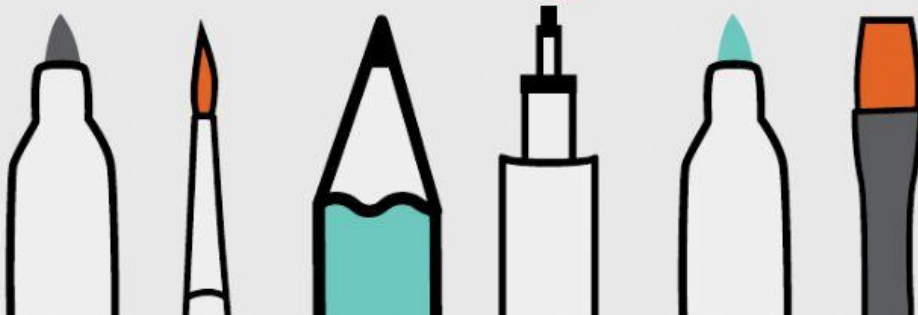
- ★ Function as _____
- ★ Describe _____, _____, and other _____.

EXAMPLE:

- ★ She will go to the movie **now**.
(adverb)

(When will she go?)

- ★ She will go to the movie **after she finishes lunch**.
(clause as adverb)
