

The Second Conditional

If + Simple Past, + Would + Verb

Would + Verb + If + Simple Past

We use the *second conditional* when talking about **future events that are not likely to happen**. It refers to a hypothetical scenario and its probable result. The if clause is in the *simple past*, and the main clause uses the *present conditional*.

- If I *had* enough money, I *would go* to Japan. Or:
- I *would go* to Japan if I *had* enough money.

Exercises: Be sure to use the contracted form of the verb i.e. 'wouldn't' rather than 'would not'.

7. If I (become) president, I (change) the social security system.
8. If I (fly) to London, I (visit) you.
9. If you (know) the answer, you (be) rich.
10. She (be) happier, if she (have) more money.
11. If she (pass) the exam, she (go) to university.
12. If she (cut) her hair, she (look) better.
