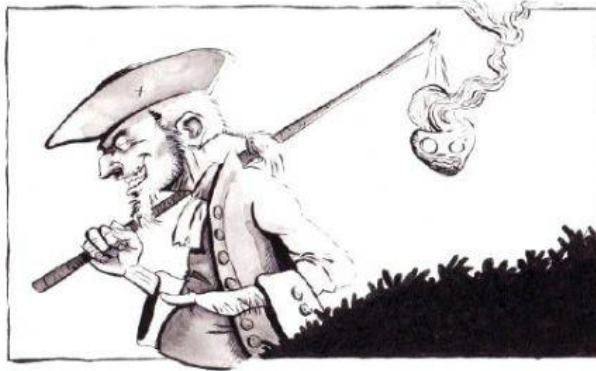




## THE TALE OF STINGY JACK
