Pronunciation of ED

/id/	/t/	/d/
<p>T wanted</p> <p>D needed</p> <p>* Voiced Sound = uses the vocal cords and they produce a vibration or humming sound in the throat. <i>(Touch your throat to feel it)</i></p>	<p>P helped</p> <p>K looked</p> <p>F sniffed</p> <p>GH laughed</p> <p>SH washed</p> <p>CH watched</p> <p>SS kissed</p> <p>C danced</p> <p>X fixed</p> <p style="text-align: center;">VOICELESS</p>	<p>L called</p> <p>N cleaned</p> <p>R offered</p> <p>G damaged</p> <p>V loved</p> <p>S used</p> <p>Z amazed</p> <p>B rubbed</p> <p>M claimed</p> <p style="text-align: center;">VOICED *</p>

Words that end in a vowel sound use the /d/ pronunciation for ED.
e.g. -- followed -- enjoyed -- played -- tried -- continued

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The pronunciation of words ending in ED depends on the final consonant sound. There are three ways to pronounce ED at the end of a word in English:

/id/ /t/ /d/
