① go sightseeing: going to see any places of interest. These may be historic or popular sites.

② take a walking tour: Some guidebooks provide walking tour information so that tourists may independently walk through a neighborhood and read about the features of the area as they walk along. For a fee, many tourist agencies also provide guided walking tours that local guides conduct.

③ take a bus tour: a tour of an area on a bus with the bus driver or an official guide explaining the sights as they pass by.

④ exchange money: Most international tourists need to exchange their own currency into the local currency. Some tourists carry traveler's checks, which are guaranteed if they are lost or stolen. It's possible to exchange these checks for the local currency in banks, hotels, and special money exchange businesses. Other tourists use their ATM cards to withdraw money from their home bank accounts in the local currency.

⑤ buy souvenirs: Souvenir is the French word for memory. In English, it means a small object that reminds a person of a place he or she visited. In areas that attract a lot of tourists, there are many souvenir stands or gift shops.

⑥ mail some postcards: In the US, it's possible to buy stamps in a post office and in some gift shops and supermarkets.

⑦ make a restaurant reservation: Better restaurants recommend or require reservations in advance of the meal. However, some very popular restaurants don't take reservations because they don't want to reserve space that people

may not use.

This is a typical conversation for making a reservation:

A. Riverside Restaurant. May I help you?

B. Yes. I'd like to make a reservation for 7:00 tonight.

A. 7:00? Certainly. How many people are in your party?

B. Two.

⑧ rent a car: In order to rent a car, the driver must have a valid driver's license and must buy some insurance coverage if that person doesn't already have car insurance.

⑨ get tickets for a show/concert: Tourists can buy tickets for a show or concert directly from the box office of the theater or through the concierge in their hotel. They may also buy tickets themselves through a telephone office such as Ticket Master, which charges a fee for every ticket.

⑩ go to a health club/fitness club: Many hotels have their own health clubs. Those hotels that don't have them on the premises sometimes offer their patrons day passes to local health or fitness clubs.

⑪ go to an Internet cafe: An Internet cafe (or cybercafe) is a place where patrons can use a computer with Internet access for a fee, usually per hour or minute. It may or may not be a regular cafe as well that serves food and drinks. These cafes are located worldwide, and most people use them when traveling to access web-mail and instant messages in order to keep in touch with family and friends.

⑫ go to a club: also called a night club. Night clubs offer dancing, light food, alcoholic drinks, and occasionally karaoke. In the United States, to enter a night club, every guest must be able to show identification that proves that he or she is over the legal drinking age (21 years old in most states).
