





RESPECTING TRADITIONS AÓNIKENK – TEHUELCHES

II. Read the following text about the different expressions of art developed by the Aónikenk people and pay attention to the underlined new vocabulary.

The Aónikenk were born as decorating artists. They had a great sense of harmony between beliefs and aesthetics. They expressed themselves with different materials and types of art:



Leather: it was the raw material most used by the Aónikenk in their handicrafts and clothing. They used all kinds of skins. Without a doubt, the best known piece made from this material was the *kai* or *quillango*. Its use was with the skin towards the interior and the leather, with decorative paintings, towards the exterior.

Music: Aónikenk were particularly interested in playing the bugle and accordion, and were especially fond of listening to the music boxes, which were brought by travelers. Their instrument called *koolo*, a wind instrument like a flute, was what gave them the greatest pleasure, obtaining from it a strange and sweet melody.



Cave painting: The cave art of Patagonia is characterized by the predominance of hands. Also, scenes with guanacos as protagonists were created by the Aónikenk. A third style of engravings flourished in later times, this time elaborated in rocky outcrops, which illustrated motifs that imitate traces of animals and humans together with geometric figures.

KAI – QUILLANGO

An exact replica of the Aónikenk handicraft!

This traditional cloak called *Kai* or *Quillango*, which is made of cattle leather, was once made up of the skins of several native and regional animals, such as guanacos, foxes, and American lions. In the exterior, you can see the same figures pattern that Aónikenk used to paint, and it also has a soft and warm fur in the inside. You can have it as part of your decoration at home, or to keep you warm.
